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#### 2021 President's Christmas Message

With Christmas and the Holiday Season nearly upon us I look back over the past year and am encouraged by the resilience of people throughout the world who have endured another year of disruption to their lives by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Eighty years ago the world was engulfed in a global conflict and the people of our nation and throughout the world made necessary sacrifices in the fight. Men and women enlisted in our Armed Services, families gave up sons and daughters, husbands and wives, fathers and mothers. Rationing of food, clothing and fuel was introduced.

We tend to remember the stoicism and forbearance that was prevalent at the time but it is worth recalling that there were also staunch anti-war advocates, protests against rationing and other measures along with opportunistic industrial action - all of which seem very familiar today.

Eighty years ago, Christmas 1941, the 2/16th Battalion was in Syria near the town of Syr. While some were billeted high in the mountains, my platoon was camped in an olive grove at the foot of the range. On Christmas Eve the area experienced the heaviest snowfall in over 25 years and we awoke to three feet of snow which had collapsed all our tents. Those in the mountains had twelve feet of snow! For men from Western Australia this was an alien landscape and one in which the novelty soon wore off as the reality of freezing conditions soon took hold. It was my first and only white Christmas.

I had had my 21st birthday in Syria just a few months earlier and would celebrate that Christmas separated from my family and friends but alongside my brothers in arms. I am fortunate to have enjoyed many, many more celebrations with friends and family in the following years but I wonder what those years might have been like if I and millions of others had refused to make those sacrifices in a time of desperate need.

This Christmas, despite many of us still unable to be with loved ones, I wish all our members a Merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year in 2022.

#### YVONNE CHRISTIAN DAY WIDOW OF WX3093 R.H. (RON) CHRISTIAN

Yvonne Marceline Antoine was born at home in Cottesloe on March 24, 1918. For some perspective as to how long ago that was, World War I was still raging at the time. The 100-year-ago Spanish Flu pandemic had just begun.

Yvonne was the seventh and youngest child of French parents, Alice Boivin and Edmond Antoine, whose family lived towards the river end of what was then Cottesloe. She recalled growing up on large property with a homestead at its centre called Cernay, after her father's birthplace in France. There was plenty of room to develop her lifelong love of nature and animals, including her beloved pet Pomeranians. She loved animals and they loved her.

She had already acquired Dickie as a lifelong nickname, apparently because the policeman's wife across the road had said that as a baby she was always hungry, just like a dickie bird. She remembered hot summer days as a young child, with she and her sister Odette bringing water for the draft horses in their dollies' pannikins as workers were repaving Stirling Highway at the family's front boundary.

As she grew older, Yvonne and her siblings frequently skipped the long walk to Cottesloe beach for a swim before school, and rode the horses that grazed around what is now the Cottesloe Civic Centre. This carefree life of family, friends and school ended abruptly in turmoil when Yvonne was just fourteen. First her mother died suddenly, followed by her father's remarriage, and then by his death three years later.

Yvonne's life was up-ended. She had to leave the family home, which was sold along with its contents. She needed to find a new home and a job, with the help of her siblings. In those days no matter how intelligent, there were few higher education or career opportunities for teenaged women.

Yvonne went to business school, and then found herself at the front counter of West Australian Newspapers in St Georges Terrace, Perth. There she was courted by handsome young advertising salesman Ron Christian, who worked at the other end of the vast entrance concourse. They were both 17. After hours they enjoyed a full social life with their many friends, with music, theatre, ballroom dancing and sailing to Rottnest Island on camping trips.

Having wanted to train as a nurse, Yvonne instead joined the Voluntary Aid Detachment, the VADs, and spent several pre-war years training as a nurse's aid as the prospect of war became inevitable. Then, turmoil again. World War II broke out and Ron, already a member of the Cameron Highlanders, disappeared to fight overseas, his destination a military secret. Before he left they became engaged, in October 1940.

Yvonne's VAD detachment called for volunteers to serve overseas (but they had to pay for their own uniforms!), and amazingly, she found that her frontline service brought her into contact with Ron's battalion in Egypt. They joyfully reconnected, considering marriage in Bethlehem, but for the rest of her life Yvonne romanticised this as a great love story, with Ron and herself at its centre.



Yvonne was a war bride, returning to Australia and marrying Ron in 1943 just after the tragic events on the Kokoda Track, before Ron disappeared again, back to the steaming, deadly jungles of the New Guinea campaign.

It's hard to believe now, but in those days it was illegal for a woman to retain her government job after she married, and heavily frowned upon in private industry. A woman might be taking the job of a family man.

So, unable as a married woman to return to active service, Yvonne continued to work as secretary to the CEO of Hollywood Hospital, until her first child was born 18 months later.

The searing experiences of war, and the enduring friendships forged in that cauldron, were repeated as Yvonne's core reference points for the rest of her life. She had also made the most of her gift of photography and writing, recording in great detail those Middle East adventures, and leaving her children with an amazing visual record of their childhoods. Their first daughter, Julie, was born in 1944.

When the war ended Ron returned to the newspaper. The couple tried to forget their wartime demons and settle into suburban life in a little house in Inglewood.

The little family soon expanded with the birth of a second daughter, Janet in 1946, then Ron was promoted to run interstate offices for the newspaper in Melbourne and Sydney, where three boys, Bret, Rodney and Gregory were added to the brood. Somehow Yvonne and Ron kept up their active social lives on the east coast, attending parties, receptions and balls, entertaining their wide circle of friends, taking the family on interesting holidays and exciting visits to the beach.

Her children recall that their parents' love of music often filled the house – Yvonne playing piano or spinning long-play records of the big musicals of the time – all the Rogers and Hammerstein smash hits and a special favourite, My Fair Lady.

They were so happy in Sydney that when Ron was recalled to become a senior newspaper executive in Perth, the family discussed staying put and finding other work.

But return they did, settling at 12 Thomson Road, Claremont, the kids squeezed into share bedrooms, until they built a larger house south of the river.

Always the adventurer, Yvonne decided the family needed a holiday shack by the beach. She found the block and Ron built the house, where for many years the family shared their parents' love of the beach, fishing and crabbing.

Both parents took a keen interest in the education of their five children, emphasising the need to master the basics, especially English and Maths. They encouraged a love of music and its performance, while Yvonne was relentless in leading her daughters to ballet – successfully with Julie, not so much with Jan. She bought Rod his first musical instruments and encouraged Bret's love of cars with his first two-stroke motor.

The older children's teenage years coincided with the appearance of bodgies, widgies and the Sixties 'revolution' with its alien rock-n-roll, hippies, anti-Vietnam War protestors and sexual liberation.

Yvonne was as bewildered and disapproving as any of her early-century contemporaries, if not more so. As the child of Edwardian parents, she struggled to come to terms with a world that was changing before her eyes, berating her children for embracing what she disparagingly called "freedom of the individual".

An intelligent woman, Yvonne did her best to understand and cope. It could not have been easy for the youngest and over-protected child of a close and privileged family, but her children made their own way in the world and successfully raised their own families.

Our parents' upbringing had been all about discipline, service to the community and respect for your elders, whether that respect was deserved or not.

Family was everything, and many are remembering Yvonne's organisation of family picnics in Kings Park, numerous house parties and the constant visitors to their beach house at Madora Bay. One of the earliest photos of a joint Antoine-Christian celebration is of children from both sides of the family at the christening of Jan and cousin Julian in 1946.

Yvonne and Ron had sold up in Melville and built a new house a few streets from their original holiday shack at Madora Bay, devoting their retirement years into community life, as well as their obsession with fishing, shared with the older grandchildren in the 1970s and '80s.

Then, as midnight clicked over on the eve of Anzac Day, 1989, Yvonne was widowed with the sudden death of Ron. Yvonne was devastated, but five years later she again found great happiness when she married the charming and likable George Day, a colleague and friend of Ron's from WA Newspapers.

Yvonne was again widowed in 1999 with the sad passing of George, but they had shared a love of the outdoors, and enjoyed five years of caravanning, camping and touring WA during that time.

Yvonne was to live another 22 years, revelling in her huge brood of children, step- children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. She lived on her own for the next 15 years, remaining stubbornly independent even when it came clear she badly needed help in looking after herself.

She became comfortable and happy at what is now called Bethanie, celebrating her 100th birthday with a huge reunion of families from Perth, Canberra, Melbourne, Singapore, London, New Zealand and France. She was delighted to welcome her father's descendants from Reims and Lyon on their first visit to Australia for her centenary.



Four generations of family gathered in March this year with admiring Bethanie staff to help Yvonne celebrate her 103rd birthday. She participated fully, engaged, charming and aware as to what was going on. Photos from the day show that clearly.

A full medical report about six weeks before Yvonne died show a clean bill of health, every organ operating normally. Typical of Yvonne, she was at the end touched by her lucky charm. She died peacefully in her bed on a Friday evening, 24 September 2021, five minutes after falling asleep.

Yvonne had a good life and a good death. We all thank and miss her.

Our sincere thanks to Yvonne's family for sharing this story of their Mother's life with us and all the readers of Pigeon Post.

At the 2/16th Association's May Lunch in 2018 those present were delighted to see Yvonne who had recently celebrated her 100th Birthday. They also 'were enthralled' by highlights of the musical "MATES" written by West Australian composer/music educator Rod Christian, son of Yvonne and Ron. Reported in June 2018 issue of Pigeon Post, an amazing yet true story of a love triangle, two soldiers, best mates, who fell in love with the same girl.

# Eulogy for Hazel Higgins St Paul's Anglican Church, Gloucester, 30/6/2021 Written by her daughter, Liz Higgins and read by her grandson, Troy Higgins

Good morning. I am Hazel's grandson, Troy Higgins, and I welcome Hazel's friends and family in the church and joining us on-line via the streaming service.

Hazel was an organised lady. Today, with only a couple of tweaks, we will be hearing the songs she wanted, the Psalm she wanted and the flowers (irises) she wanted. And, of course, we are here in the Church she attended for much of her life (even if the Catholics did get her children for a while).

Hazel leaves us at the age of 92. Born in October 1928 as a Latimore, she was the oldest of 4 children – Phyllis & Joan, and Eric deceased.

She wasn't always "a townie". Half of her life was spent living on farms in the Gloucester district – starting as a child on Merewether Lane before moving to Wirragerie (off the Bundook Road); then as a wife and mother at Barrington.

As a child, she grew up in the extended Latimore and Merchant families. As Nell (her mother) was one of fifteen Merchant children there were plenty of days playing with siblings, aunts, uncles and cousins. Playing cards, riding horses and walking over the Wirragerie property to Ninnie and Pop's house (her father's parents) were times Hazel spoke about often and with fondness.

On finishing school in Maitland, Hazel got a job in Gloucester at Parrish and Street (now IGA) as an accounts clerk and loved to dance away her Saturday nights with friends and family at the local dance halls.



In her early 20s, Hazel met and married Ted and, a year later, when Ted's father died, they moved to the Higgins dairy farm at Barrington where they first share farmed it with Ted's mother Esther, then rented it from her before owning it themselves. Four children were born – three boys and a girl – Tony, Terry, Peter (deceased last year) and Elizabeth.

Life changed direction for Hazel when she was in her early 40s when Ted and her decided to move off the farm and into Gloucester based on medical advice that Ted move to a lighter occupation than dairying. They decided to build their own home and Hazel found the land she liked in Onslow Street. They moved into their new home in 1975 – the house that Hazel lived in up until her death last week.

So, what did Hazel enjoy?

Her 5 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren. She always wanted to know what we had been up to.

Gardening. Hazel for years had a cottage garden (before I knew what one was).



Keeping active. With sport and as a volunteer for community organisations (church guilds, meals on wheels, Probus). She played tennis, golf, bowls and croquet. With golf (she played for many years), strong friendships were formed that lasted for decades. Then as she got older she kept active by "circuit training" – walking up the high school lane, through the hospital and down the hill to home. This she did every other day until early this year.

Playing cards with family and with friends – 500, euchre and canasta. Hazel was very competitive at cards; as children we sometimes cried because she wouldn't let us win!

Travel – with Ted to army reunions across Australia and overseas to New Zealand, Hong Kong and Europe to visit Elizabeth; she had numerous holidays with old friends and new friends on cruises, bus and train trips.

And now we say goodbye to Hazel. She departs our lives with one treasured possession still intact – a valid NSW Drivers Licence expiry not until 2026!

Thank you to Mary's family who have provided us with two eulogies from her funeral service; a service that celebrated her long and well-lived life! I decided that I could not combine the two eulogies and do them, or Mary justice, so here they both are. They remind us of an age that will soon be forgotten, how life was in the early 20th century and the strength of the womenfolk as they embraced a whole new world of the late 20th and then the 21st century.

#### MARY MABEL MOREY 21st June 1920 - 9th October 2021

Mary was born to Mabel and Rueben Dorrell, publicans in Gillingham, England, in their home above the pub. In 1924, at the age of 4, Mary came to Australia with her parents and they settled on a sheep and pig farm called Dunkton near Bridgetown. Sadly, they lost this farm but with their last £50 they put a deposit down on a 100 acre block, sold to them by a neighbour Bert Young. To pay off the block Bob worked for Bert during the week and on weekends, with the aid of young Mary, and a horse, they cleared the block. The property was named "Cloverlea" and is still in the Dorrell family today.

Once the block was cleared Bert gave the Durrells 6 cows so they could start a herd for milking. The house from Dunkton was moved to Cloverlea and Mary's father added to this home. Mary having a new bedroom with only a hessian door, was at times scared by dingoes who would come to her door.

Mary had little schooling but did what she could by correspondence. Her mother passed away when Mary was just 18 and so Mary helped raise her brother until her Dad remarried.

Living on the farm Mary would milk the cows, process the milk and also grow vegetables. She was able to milk 10 cows in an hour, of course by hand. Mary would start at 4am and finish just before the cream truck arrived at 8am. During the depression the lowest "cream" cheque for a month was £2. 1shilling. The farm also provided vegetables, meat, butter and bread.

WWII saw Mary continuing to milk 29 cows, twice daily, by hand until they purchased a milking machine that made the process a lot easier.

After the war, at a party for a returning soldier, Mary met Eric Morey. Courting was mainly by mail as the only way Eric could visit Mary was via the "Cream Truck." Engaged in 1947 and married in 1949, Mary and Eric honeymooned in Albany before making their home with Eric's parents on their farm Doopenup Flats, 7 miles from Manjimup.

On the sale of that property in 1951, now a family of 3, the Moreys moved to Wodanilling and then to West Wagin for Eric to gain experience working on a wheat and sheep farm.

A couple of years later, the now family of four, moved to working on the War Service Land Settlement Project. Here they lived in a three room tent prior to being allotted a farm now known as Marrivale and there they moved into the original farmhouse.

Mary continued to work alongside Eric and again milked cows to provide milk for the family and sold the cream to make extra money. When the Bokerup Community Hall was built Mary was very involved with fund raising and cooking for the events that were held.

By 1961 Mary and Eric had four children who all went on to attend Franklin River Primary School and then high school in Manjimup.

Mary's garden was one of her passions, always providing vegetables in season as well as having an orchard and Rose and flower gardens. The old farmhouse was relocated to a new location up the hill and away from the sheds and creek in the late 1960s. Mary, again, started a new orchard and garden around the house. In the 1970s a new farm house was built on that location.

Both of Mary and Eric's sons, Bill and Rob, worked on the farm after completing their schooling. Due to Eric's ill health, in the early eighties, Eric and Mary retired but stayed living on the farm; later also spending time at their house in Manjimup.

Retirement saw them 'travel Australia', but apparently Eric was impatient and did not want to "sight-see", wanting to get from point A to B to visit friends and relatives. A quick trip round the world saw them visit relatives in England and America.

After Eric passed away in 1997 Mary spent most of her time on the farm where she was happiest looking after her sons and grandchildren and still being involved in the Frankland CWA. Before Mary left the farm she was awarded Life Membership of that CWA branch.

When each of Mary's great grandchildren was born Mary set about knitting squares to make into blankets for them.

Mary moved permanently to the house in Manjimup in 2007 where her garden was still her passion, growing all varieties of flowers as well as tending a vegetable garden. This she did until around the age of 92. Mary had settled into town life and visited her daughters, Kathleen and Jen frequently.

In 2013 Mary made the move to Moonya where she busied herself helping out as much as possible. That was what Mary always used to do to get things done! Mary was very particular about how she liked her bed made and staff would certainly be told if it was not done correctly. Mary walked with the aid of her walker and she was nicknamed "Speedy Gonzales" as she moved so fast that the staff had to hurry to keep up with her. Mary tried to keep herself busy by knitting squares for blankets and covers for wooden coat hangers. Mary loved her food and hated to see food left on a plate. When taken out by family, or to appointments, she would continually look at the time to let us know that she had to get back so she would not miss out on meals.

Mary was a very independent lady and liked to do everything for herself as much as she could. She shared many stories about her years as a child and also enjoyed sharing the memories of family holidays at Hamelin Bay, staying in old trams and then progressing onto a tent and then a caravan.

Mary became a Centenarian in June 2020 and enjoyed the celebrations organised by and shared with her loving family.

Mary rarely missed the 2/16th Association Annual Country Reunion functions in Bunbury usually accompanied by Kathleen or Jen or both daughters. In fact she was dearly missed this year and the last couple of years, by members who always looked forward to her beautiful smile and very welcome company.

# MARY MABEL MOREY WIDOW OF WX4870 ERIC OSMOND MOREY FROM HER YOUNGEST SON RON

101 years-What a great innings. She has been saying that she is old and worn since she was 80 and yet she has lived another 21 years. It is not easy trying to find friends of hers when you have lived 101 years and 4 months.

Mary Dorrell was born in 1920 and she was 12 when her brother Ed was born in 1932. Her mother, Mabel died of TB in 1938 when Mary was 18. Ed was only 6! Mary's mother had been sick for 6 years so spent a lot of time in Perth away from her family. That meant that Mary and her father Bob had to carry on with the farm and chores and look after a young Edward. Mary formed a very strong bond with her brother, sadly Ed passed away in his early 50s.

For many years Mary, Ed and their father only went to town in Manjimup once a year.

Mary was a pioneering woman who just simply did what had to be done; no dilly dallying, just get on with it. If her children had an accident Mary would put on a bandaid, strap them up and say "you are alright".

Most of her life Mary grew a good veggie garden and fruit trees that she used for food and also to make preserves for the off season. She also milked cows providing milk for the house for many, many years.

It is quite modern these days and referred to as 'organic' and being 'self sufficient'. In Mary's day it was called 'survival' and a way of life.

Mary ran a good household for her family who were always well fed and looked after. Mary always raised chooks, some to eat but mainly for eggs. One of son Rob's chores was to shut the chooks up and collect the eggs after school. Mary sold eggs to friends in Franklin. There were no egg cartons in those days so each egg had to be wrapped individually in newspaper and placed in a stock branding tin that had been made into an egg Billy. Rob reckoned that he did not stand out much, walking onto the bus in his brown sandals and handing over a hand made egg billy to the driver in front of all the other kids.

In 2007 Mary was driving to Manjimup and was going a bit too fast and she lost control and her car rolled over a few times and finished up on its roof. Luckily for Mary two locals were fencing in a paddock nearby and rushed over and pulling her door off, undid her seatbelt and moved her to safety. Mary's first remark was "I hope the three dozen eggs in the boot are ok???" Mary suffered a few bruises which healed in a few weeks, but she needed a new car as she had "totalled" the other one.

87 year old Mary, as usual, just kept on going and kept driving. She did slow down a little bit!



In Mary's life of 101 years life has changed so much. A horse was more reliable and faster than the automobiles of the day. A horse was the main source of transport, if you were fortunate enough to have one. There were no jet planes, TVs, electricity, fridges, microwaves, washing machines, computers etc etc.

Mary lived in a marvellous time; she experienced an industrial revolution that is not comparable to any other. Mary loved her gas stove, washing machine, telephone and TV. A fridge and freezer were life changing and remarkable. Mary grasped the

use of a mobile phone and used it well until only a few years ago.

Mary's husband Eric passed in 1997. So it was just Mary and son Rob on the farm. Mary wanted Rob to have his own life partner and for her to wind down and go and live in Manjimup. In 2007 Lisa joined Rob on the farm which made Mary very content and happy for her son. At 87 Mary moved to Manjimup. She liked town life and enjoyed her neighbours, arts and crafts, bingo and church, also still growing a veggie garden.

Rob had lived with his mother Mary for 46 years and and commented that you always knew where you stood with her. As he wished her well to the other side, he said "Happy Journey Mum -- and no doubt you will let them know if something is not to your liking."

#### EILEEN PATRICIA LYNCH WIDOW OF WX 30145 JOHN (JACK) LYNCH April 1925 - September 2021



Eileen Patricia Ryan, the sixth of eight children, was born to George Valentine & Mary Pauline Ryan.



Early in 1923, under the Australian Government's Group Settlement Scheme, the family, Eileen's parents and her four older brothers and sisters, had come to Australia from their home in Ireland. The farming lot they were allocated was in Cowaramup in Western Australia's south west. Life in those early years was extremely difficult as the newly arrived prospective farmers were expected to clear the heavily timbered land by hand. Living conditions were very basic until a house was built on the property.

Sadly, when Eileen was only eight, her father was killed in a traffic accident. This necessitated Eileen and her younger sister Kath, going to boarding school as her widowed mother had to seek employment.



Eileen met her future husband Jack, when she accompanied a workmate, Molly on a hospital visit. Molly was visiting her nephew Jack in hospital where he was recovering from malaria, a condition he had caught whilst serving as a soldier in WWII.

Apparently Jack decided there and then that Eileen was the girl for him! Eileen and Jack married in St Mary's Cathedral in Perth on 19th July 1947.

Jack's service in WWll made them eligible for a War Service home and they 'were beyond excited' when they were told that they were next in line.

A home became available in Floreat and that began the family's life long association with Floreat and the church in Wembley. In the early years their home was only the third house completed in their street and Eileen remembered regularly seeing kangaroos in the native bush on the other side of their road



The nearest bus stop was a very, very long walk, especially for Eileen pushing the pram all the way. The family never missed a Sunday Mass, walking to and from every week, occasionally getting a lift from neighbours who had a car.

Eileen was a wonderful cook and was very house proud, working tirelessly ensuring that everything in the house was 'just so', and then would knit or sew for her children in the evenings. As Jack was on numerous committees and involved with volunteer groups Eileen always kept 'the home fires burning' and was always so supportive.

Many Saturday mornings would find her making many rounds of sandwiches that Jack would take along to the Past Players' Room for the after game functions at their beloved West Perth. (WAFL CLUB).

They had a great group of "West Perthite" friends and would regularly celebrate with them. One thing that everyone associates with Eileen was her "cup of tea"; no excuse was ever needed to sit down and enjoy a cuppa!

Even in her final days at MercyCare when the family would visit, there was Eileen, with both hands wrapped around a cup.

Eileen's beloved husband Jack passed in 2010 and she was determined to stay in the family home. This she did, managing very well until she had several falls. Her family thought that the time had come for Eileen to progress to the next stage of her life.

Although at first reluctant to leave her family home, Eileen understood her family's concerns, and so agreed to move into Mercy Care in Wembley in November 2019. Eileen quickly adapted to her new surroundings and would tell her family how lucky she was to be in such a beautiful room, in lovely surroundings. With just a couple of hiccups along the way, Eileen remained in very good health.

'Eileen was a truly wonderful Mum, we could not have asked for anyone better. Since her passing her family have received very many comments, from family and friends about the impact she made on the lives of others, often through a gentle word of encouragement or acceptance, or providing an ear just to listen and always having a smile on her face.

Eileen never complained no matter how difficult a situation was. Family was so important and many, who were friends, became like family to her.

Whilst grieving the loss of Eileen, the family take comfort in the fact that she is now reunited with her husband Jack, her parents and her brothers and sisters. They are very grateful that Eileen was lent to them for her allotted life span, to be their Mum, their teacher, their sounding board, their guide, their friend and, instilled in them the skills that they needed to live full and happy lives.

Eileen has done her duty very well and has now gone to enjoy a very well earned rest.'

Thank you to Eileen's daughter, Maureen, for allowing us to tell you of Eileen's life from her Eulogy.

Maureen wrote "This does not come any near doing justice to what an amazing wife, Mother and community member she was, but it does give a good insight. As you know our Dad was a wonderful man too; Patricia, Kathleen and I were so blessed to have such wonderful parents."

We remember Eileen with fondness and know she loved the Association's May lunches and everyone loved seeing her there. Maureen tells us that Eileen felt she was 'spoilt' by the 2/16th.

#### NORM WHEATLEY - 100TH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

**CONGRATULATIONS** to Veteran WX4280 Norman George Wheatley of Canberra who celebrated his 100th birthday on 28th September.

Norm and wife Joy's amazing neighbours staged a fitting Covid-safe, (maximum 5 people, all masked except when drinking or eating) celebration in "lockdown" on their front lawn.

The Minister for Veteran Affairs, Andrew Gee posted, on his Facebook page, his congratulations to Norm for his centenary birthday.

"Happy 100th Birthday to Norman Wheatley who was born in Perth. In June 1940, Norm joined the Australian Army and was a signalman serving with the 2/16th Australian Infantry Battalion. He was based in the Middle East, Palestine, Syria and Australia.

Norm recalls one event on a Friday 13th when they were fighting the Vichy French and had to retreat. They left a bundle (booby trap) for the Vichy French, and it was set off by a soldier. Norm remembers the incident every Friday 13th!

(NOTE: Patrick Hone, Norm's neighbour, posted this correcting comment on the Minister's Facebook page in regard to his encapsulation of Norm's story:

"Just had COVID-19 safe lunch with Norm and Joy. Ever the perfectionist Joy asked me to correct one point above "They left a bundle for the Vichy French," – in fact the reverse was the case, the Vichy French had left a bundle (booby-trap) that was set off by an Australian soldier.)

When he came home to Australia, Norm and others were sent to Mooloolaba to defend Australia, armed only with their .303 rifles. Norm was 'mates for life' with members of his Battalion. He is a current member of the 2/16th Battalion Association.

Before the war Norm won a scholarship to Perth Modern School but he was unable to attend as his family needed him to work. After the war he was able to go straight to university without matriculating. Norm is a qualified accountant and an Arts graduate. He moved to Canberra to set up the Audit Branch for the Department of Territory and later travelled around setting up libraries and computers in schools. Norm joined the Australian Public Service in 1963. He has been married to Joy since 1949.

Norm credits his long life to staying mentally and physically active, and being cared for by Joy."

#### UPDATE FROM CO 16RWAR LT. COL. LEIGH PARTRIDGE

As we approach the end of a busy year, 2021 has proven to be another rewarding year in both operational and training settings. The year commenced at a hectic pace in early February with our soldiers immediately being required to support multiple domestic support tasks associated with the Perth Hills Bush Fires, COVID 19 tasks and State Government lockdowns. Demonstrating the continued commitment to soldiering and support to the community, 16 RWAR (and 13 Brigade ) soldiers were deployed within 24 hours to assist the Police and Emergency Services in clean-up efforts for fires or implementing COVID lockdown restrictions. The speed of response and willingness to support the community was pleasing to see and encapsulates some of the service values that the unit stands for.

As April approached (and having just conducted a refit from the February/March tasks), Tropical Cyclone Seroja struck the Kalbarri coastline causing significant damage across a wide front. Again, the unit was required to rapidly deploy engineer/infantry teams in order to assist the emergency services during the post cyclone clean up. A grouping of 65 personnel from 13 Brigade (including 25 members from 16RWAR) deployed to Geraldton and provided immediate assistance in the aftermath of the cyclone. Over a two week period, spanning ANZAC Day, 16 RWAR personnel ably assisted the WA emergency services with supporting the Kalbarri region to get back on its feet after the destruction caused by TC Seroja.

During the second half of the year, the operational tempo eased and the unit was able to get back to training. The focus for the unit was improving our corps skills and preparing ourselves for new capabilities that will be brought into 16RWAR throughout 2022. Individual training courses, trade specific promotion courses, combat shooting, infantry minor tactics and engineer specific qualifications was the main effort in order to set a solid foundation for the 2022 training programme and organisational changes.

Excitingly for 16RWAR, 2022 will see the introduction of new capabilities. Changes to the Army's footprint in WA, which has included the re-raising of 10 Light Horse Regiment and planned growth of 13 Field Squadron to an engineer regiment, will see 16RWAR establishing a small boat capability and reconnaissance element. This growth has already commenced with soldiers completing small boat courses and into the future

it will see 16RWAR working closely with other amphibious elements under the evolving Army Littoral Manoeuvre concept. In addition to the growth of AMPHIB in 16RWAR, foundation warfighting will continue to be a mainstay in the training programme, building on the training completed this year.

Finally, as we break for Christmas, I ask that you spare a thought for the unit's members who are again deployed to Darwin, supporting operations in the Torres Strait. 20 members of the unit will be deployed, to support border protection in various roles, with the first element commencing tasks in early December. These members will remain on task throughout the Christmas/New Year period, conducting important operational tasks, but away from their families.

I look forward to catching up with the 2/16th Association members in early 2022 and being involved with commemorating the 80th Anniversary of the Kokoda Campaign.

## ADDRESS BY OC GUILDFORD GRAMMAR SCHOOL CADET UNIT KOKODA MEMORIAL DAY

Good Morning. My name is Martin Dell and I am the Officer Commanding of the Guildford Grammar School Cadet Unit. I am honoured to have been asked to address you this morning. As many of you would be aware, Brigadier Arnold Potts was an old boy of Guildford Grammar School and served as a Colour Sergeant in the school cadet unit around 110 years ago. When Mary asked me to speak this morning on the topic of 'what Kokoda means to me', it led me to reflect upon my knowledge of the campaign

and of military history more widely. Having grown up in the 1970s in the UK, the major military events I had been aware of at that time were The Western Front, Dunkirk, The Battle of Britain and D Day.

My family had certainly been impacted by both World Wars. One of my great-grandfathers served in The Royal Navy during World War I and saw action in The Battle of The Falkland Islands, whilst both my grandfathers served in The Royal Navy during World War II. My father was evacuated from Plymouth, where his family lived close to the docklands, during the height of the Blitz. One of my mother's maternal cousins was raised by my maternal grandparents after his father was killed in The Battle of Britain. For my family, my generation was the first that was not directly affected by war and certainly I do not recall hearing, or learning, about the Kokoda Campaign whilst I was at school in the United Kingdom.

When I initially moved to Perth in 2000, I initially recall hearing about the Kokoda Track as a physical challenge or teambuilding exercise, but even then I was not aware of the military history behind it. It was not until I started teaching at Guildford in 2008 and later became involved with the cadet unit that I started to become acquainted with the significance of the campaign.

I was privileged to be invited to one of the Foundations early Dinners, in 2013, and recall the impact that chatting to some of the veterans had, on both myself and the senior cadets who attended. The matter of fact way in which they recalled the hardships and dangers they had endured was certainly memorable.

So having set the scene with regard to my knowledge of the campaign, or rather the lack of it, what does Kokoda mean to me? I think that three different aspects of the campaign stand out.

Firstly, the extreme physical hardship and prolonged proximity to the enemy endured by the soldiers during the campaign are notable. Whilst there are some parallels with Gallipoli, The Western Front and Vietnam, the heat and steep terrain of The Kokoda Track are notorious and indeed, are often described as the defining features of the campaign.

Secondly, I believe the campaign was a clear example of Brigadiers Potts' tactical awareness and military leadership. Despite overwhelming odds, the difficult terrain, the lack of effective communications and the number of wounded carried by his men, he managed to achieve a fighting withdrawal back along the Track.

Lastly, the Kokoda Campaign highlights the gulf between those who actively participate in combat and those who observe from a distance, either in higher command, in government at the time, or indeed, those who look back through the years as we do today.

I think it is almost impossible for those who have not been called to serve during time of war, to fully appreciate the hardships and suffering that those men endured. All we can do is be thankful that they did and that young men and women continue to be willing to serve in our Defence Force today.

#### REMEMBRANCE DAY 2021 KINGS PARK PERTH

A large crowd gathered at the Flame of Remembrance at the State War Memorial just prior to 11AM on Thursday 11th November. A very warm spring day greeted the assembled people, veterans, families, dignitaries and many who just wanted to show their respect and gratitude, as they waited for the commemoration to begin.

2021 Remembrance Day Commemorations were held in the presence of The Hon. Kim Beazley AC, Governor of Western Australia, the Premier Mark McGowan and senior representatives of the three Armed Services, The Salvation Army and the WA Police Force. Mr John McCourt, CEO of RSLWA was the MC.

The Churchlands Senior High School Band and Choir played in the lead up to the ceremony including a fine rendition of the 16th Marching Song.

The two Pipers in attendance from the Australian Army Band Perth Pipes and Drums were two of our associate members, Davina Goldthorpe and Damien Stilwell. #### REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE ARALUEN BOTANIC PARK WA 11.11.2021

On Remembrance Day this year I had the very great pleasure of laying a wreath on behalf of the Association at Araluen Botanic Park. Araluen is situated some 60 kms from Perth in a sheltered valley in the Darling Ranges. As locals would know, Araluen has a very long history. The Grove of the Unforgotten was built to honour the memory of 88 Young Australia League (YAL) members killed in World War 1. It is situated on a steep hillside with a waterfall, gardens and amazing stone walls and footpaths.

The first Armistice Day Ceremony, now called Remembrance Day, was held at the site in 1934. The Pool of Reflection is at the base of the Grove and those wreaths that would float were put amongst the lilies. The others were placed along the pool wall. There were at least a dozen colourful displays.

The Commemorative Address was given by Joe Librizzi, a Vietnam Veteran, who related a different side of that War than we usually hear about. It was his personal experience when assisting a local village re-establish food crops and a market place. His Christmas church service being like no other!! It was very moving.

Two young men from Armadale Senior High School spoke also. One recited a poem called "Forever We Shall Remember" while the other lad told the story of Private John Mason, an Aboriginal soldier. Three young ladies from Roleystone Community College sang two songs. It was great to see so many schools involved in the occasion, both primary and secondary levels. Each school in attendance laid a wreath.
